The platform empowers businesses to seamlessly accept payments and distribute payouts of over 20 different cryptocurrencies and provides users with the flexibility to buy, swap and spend their digital assets. As a backend engineer, I leverage technologies such as Node.js and MongoDB to continuously improve core features such as invoicing, payouts, gift cards and bill payments. Beyond customer-facing products, I collaborate on cross-functional projects, developing internal tools and management systems to support the customer success and compliance teams in daily operations.

MOST SIGNIFICANT CAREER MILESTONES

Throughout my career thus far, my most significant milestones have been marked by my growth in tackling increasingly complex projects. As an intern, I initially handled smaller tasks such as code adjustments for screening wallet addresses and monitoring transactions. However, since then I have been able to transition to more substantial contributions, taking the lead in integrating with major third-party APIs and platforms like Salesforce, Stripe, Shopify and Palantir. These integrations allowed me to develop and implement new products and tools from scratch, significantly enhancing our operations at BitPay. Through each project, I have honed my skills, expanded my expertise and made tangible impacts on the company's success.

Following my graduation from GCU in April of 2021, I was hired for a three-month development internship at BitPay. Being in the emerging field of digital currency, I am presented with daily opportunities to make an impact through new ideas and the continuous scaling of existing platforms. During my time as a software developer so far, I created an extensive merchant onboarding and reviewing system, which processed over 6,000 new applications within the first three months of its launch. This initiative provides businesses with the opportunity to quickly and easily enter into the digital currency space. I developed a Shopify payment extension that enables merchants to accept cryptocurrency as a form of payment on their online stores, accumulating over 10,000 installs within the first year and allowing customers to utilize their cryptocurrency for daily transactions. I implemented a geofencing system designed to restrict currencies or features based on customer and/or merchant location, ensuring compliance with legal regulations nationwide. Each of these tasks has helped further the expansion and adoption of cryptocurrency from all perspectives.





AWARDS, ACCOLADES AND ACHIEVEMENTS







PROFESSIONAL BIO:

As counsel for the House Energy and Commerce Committee, Subcommittee on Communications and Technology, I see legislation develop firsthand and actively participate in the process of lawmaking. By engaging with key stakeholders, conducting congressional hearings and drafting legislation, the subcommittee confronts the field of communications policy by conducting oversight of agencies within its jurisdiction and directing the course of the communications industry conversation in the U.S. In this role, I handle the areas of wireline and satellite communications policy. Though these two jurisdictions seem far apart, wires in the ground and satellites in space, both require an in-depth knowledge of the technical and economic nature of their respective industries. After consulting with stakeholders, both public and private, it is my job to develop policies that benefit the American people.

MOST SIGNIFICANT CAREER MILESTONES

Getting a bill signed into law will forever be a crowning achievement. H.R. 7521, the Protecting Americans from Foreign Adversary Controlled Applications Act, requires TikTok to divest from its parent company ByteDance or face a ban in the U.S. The process of drafting this legislation took over a year and resulted in several late nights and long weekends negotiating the draft language. After this legislation passed the U.S. House of Representatives, it remained in the Senate until it was swept into the Israel, Ukraine and Taiwan Aid package and signed into law by the president on April 24, 2024. The legislative process is a fascinating thing to witness firsthand. I cannot describe the feeling of seeing a bill you poured hours of labor into in order to receive the required votes for passage. Standing on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives and watching those votes come in is a moment I'll never forget, and will always remember the individuals who worked together to make this possible. From members of Congress, our sister subcommittees and the staff on other committees, this was truly a herculean effort that would not have been possible without each individual rowing in the same direction and putting the American people before themselves.

CAREER HISTORY

After receiving my bachelor's degree at GCU in 2017, I attended the University of Colorado School of Law. In September 2018, during my second year of law school, I was diagnosed with acute lymphocytic leukemia. After taking a year off from school to pursue full-time treatment, I returned to school Monday through Thursday and received chemotherapy on Friday. My final treatment came three years later, just a few months after taking the Colorado bar exam, which I still can't believe I passed. Those years brought many things: a pandemic, the love of my life (Abbie) and the opportunity to pursue a lifelong dream of moving to Washington D.C. Upon graduation from the University of Colorado, I started a job at the Department of Commerce working at the National Telecommunication and Information Administration (NTIA), where I had interned during law school. As an attorney advisor, I had the opportunity to provide counsel on several federal grant programs. Those programs include the \$1 billion Middle Mile Grant Program and the \$42.45 billion Broadband Equity, Access and Deployment Program. In 2021, I received a call from my former intern coordinator at NTIA with the opportunity of a lifetime, a committee counsel position on Capitol Hill. While the position at its start would not provide its own portfolio, it would provide an opportunity to join a fantastic team and learn the ins and outs of the legislative branch. After 10 months, I was given a portfolio of wireline and satellite communications.

IMPACT ON FIELD

Congressional oversight and legislative hearings are an excellent opportunity to impact the communications industry. The process leading up to a hearing requires interviewing potential witnesses, drafting a memo summarizing and detailing the boundaries of discussion and creating questions for members of Congress who rely on committee expertise to dig at the heart of nascent issues in the field. Unearthing strange subjects and highlighting unsatisfactory agency endeavors can pave the way for meaningful conversation, the result of which can be further inquiry or even legislative action. Conducting these hearings is a primary piece of my role as counsel and seeing the fruits of that labor on CSPAN is certainly a perk of the job. Outside of the congressional process, the field of communications law and policy, especially in Washington D.C., feels a lot like a family. This tight-knit community raised me through law school and provided me with the opportunity that became my first job. Providing that same opportunity to other law students has been a great joy. D.C. thrives on quick coffee or happy hour meetups. Opening spaces for unfamiliar students to meet some of the titans of the tech industry is an absolute joy. My success has come from someone who practiced the "Pay It Forward" way of life and I've thoroughly enjoyed doing the same whenever I can.

As a student at GCU, I was heavily involved in student government, ultimately being elected student body president my senior year. During this time, I was also selected for the National Campus Leadership Council and the Henry Clay Center for Statesmanship Program. During my time at the University of Colorado School of Law, I was a member of the Colorado Technology Law Journal as the Managing Editor, publishing a paper in the 19th version of the journal titled, "Cybersecurity and the U.N. Charter: A Square Peg in a Round Hole." I was also invited to the Blackstone Legal Fellowship, received the Pay It Forward and J.J. Witt Memorial Scholarship and took third place in the Silicon Flatirons Interdisciplinary Ethics Tech Competition. In my professional career, I was awarded a Bronze Medal for government service by the Department of Commerce and, in my current role, participated in the Wilson Center's Foreign Policy Fellowship Program."

ADVICE

Uncertainty led me to hesitate to make a decision unless I felt like I had "figured it out." The wheels of life are ever-turning and ever-changing. I have discovered in my seven years since graduation that uncertain action is often better than certain inaction. The Lord is the director of our paths. The sooner we start walking, the easier it is for him to direct our next step. As we realize that we are figuring it out instead of needing to have it figured out before taking a leap of faith forward, stress begins to fade away and the resolve of confident action takes its place. Embrace the uncertainty of the ride before you. No one enjoys a rollercoaster if they wince at every jolt and turn.





Having this in place I have been able to create lessons for nationwide schools and connect with students. This has also allowed me to connect my students with their peers around the country. The Character Education Program for Civics Literacy is my latest contribution. This is a program that students complete over a series of months and, by the end of it, have a greater understanding of themselves and how they serve their school and are leaders in the classroom. It comes from a holistic approach to character education in the school setting. By learning about themselves as individuals and how they serve their communities and lead, students are going to be leaving traditional schooling with a deeper understanding of who they are and how they can effectively contribute to the needs of societal flourishing.

A leadership rule I was taught as a college senior was "never complain side-to-side," and this is still a rule I hold within my team. We don't want to simply gossip. We want to take real issues and find solutions, which can, most of the time, only be done through higher leadership. This is a delicate balance as there may be an emotional moment, and a leader can handle that to then help address the situation. A leader isn't the person who always has the best skills, the most knowledge or the most experience. From my own experience, a leader is someone who is teachable, will advocate for the needs and desires of their team and can admit when they are wrong. They don't use their reputation or position as power over anyone but collaborate with people to create greater success for the whole.

ADVICE

What I wish I was told: 1. You are a human first and everything else second. You are always enough. 2. No one out of college, in their 30s or in their 60s has it "all figured out." We are all out here doing the best we can with the cards we hold. You learn by asking questions. Don't be afraid to do so. Ask as many questions as you can because people are more willing to help than you may think. 3. Put yourself out there and ask to get involved in your field as much as you can. Go to as many different settings as you can for your potential job field. Firstly, it helps you network and create those relationships that can help secure jobs. Secondly, you will be exposed to all the potential places you want to work and do not want to work. 4. It's okay not to know. Get comfortable saying, "I don't know." The more you admit this, the more you can begin to grow as a human. 5. Your time and talent are valuable. Do not sell yourself short. Your boss and how they treat their employees are equally important to the number on your paycheck. 6. Start to develop healthy work/life/ relationship boundaries early. The earlier you start, the easier they become and you will more than likely be ahead of your coworkers. 7. People aren't thinking about you as much as you think they are.

ADVICE

Looking back, these questions gave me time to be patient and reflect on why I wanted to be a counselor and how God put me on this Earth to fulfill this calling. 

IMPACT ON FIELD

While pursuing my PhD, I began to see that change is happening in nursing, but is not happening enough. For example, through both my practice and academic endeavors, I have found that hospice and palliative care do not get enough attention. Emotional intelligence is often overlooked, so I would like to contribute heavily to that in the future. In clinical research, two drugs were passed by the FDA with help from trials I helped coordinate, and I worked on over 90 other promising ones throughout my time in clinical research services. Currently, I am working in conjunction with another university on a study that improves mental health in nursing students. I also feel I bring a positive influence into the academic arena by encouraging younger students to understand that age does not confine them to bedside nursing or a single degree. I also bring up the idea that nursing school does not need to be unpleasant. There is always someone to listen and always a chair to cry in after an exam. 





IMPACT ON FIELD



As an emergency manager, my work helps to keep Coconino County a safer place and allows us to bounce back resiliently from the consequences of natural and manmade disasters. Combining my undergraduate degree in justice studies and graduate education in homeland security and emergency management, I constantly strive to bring a unique perspective to communities in crisis. Utilizing my professional skills and passion for creative writing, I found my niche in composing emergency operations plans, after-action reports and hazard mitigation plans with expressive language and innovative structure. Being able to make these plans not only informative, but also illustrative and pleasurable to read is a trait I pride myself on. Without the opportunity to expand my horizons through GCU's graduate program, I couldn't see myself in the position I am in today. I hope to continue helping communities prepare and recover from disasters as a result of my education and professional growth.

MOST SIGNIFICANT CAREER MILESTONES

Since joining Coconino County nearly two years ago, I've assisted and enhanced their emergency management department's ability to adapt to constantly shifting goalposts. Crises and disasters are fluid, and the effects of each emergency almost always present themselves differently. The first significant milestone of my career was writing the county's distribution management plan, a first of its kind throughout our jurisdiction. As a result of the logistical challenges faced by the COVID-19 pandemic, The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) introduced guidance requiring that all recipients of their grants maintain a distribution management plan. This was uncharted territory for most of the nation, as few jurisdictions had ever written a plan to prepare for a total supply-chain breakdown. Preparing this plan for the county placed us back into eligibility for grant funding and consequently made them the beneficiaries of hundreds of thousands of dollars that will be used to enhance emergency management activities. Subsequently, as an effort to continue fortifying the county's planning infrastructure, I successfully led and managed a complete revitalization of the Coconino County Emergency Operations Plan. Over the course of 2023, we revamped the plan to be more useable and readable, reducing it from over 700 pages to less than 100. This document is the cornerstone of emergency management operations, comprising roles and responsibilities for county departments and emergency operations center personnel to execute during a disaster. Bringing this document into the 21st century has and will continue to provide effective emergency management guidance for years to come.

CAREER HISTORY

I didn't always think I'd end up working in emergency management, and if you had asked me in 2016 when I began my undergraduate degree, it was a field tucked far back in the corner of my mind. As a criminal justice student, my heart was set on pursuing a career in law enforcement. The process of becoming a federal agent was long and arduous, so in the meantime, I began to look into other opportunities in public safety, where I became drawn to emergency management. As a manager in the retail industry straight out of my undergraduate degree, biding my time for a career in law enforcement, I decided to re-enroll at GCU and pursue a graduate degree in leadership with an emphasis in homeland security and emergency management. Using my education as a springboard, I arrived at Coconino County in 2022, ready to put my newfound skills to work. It's in that position I remain today. With the county, I've had the honor and task of working with our local government partners and forging strong relationships with the City of Page and the Town of Tusayan to strengthen our preparedness and response efforts. Recently, I had the opportunity to assist Page in writing their own emergency operations plan, further expanding countywide resiliency. Developing relationships across the state and continuing to protect residents and visitors to northern Arizona is a calling I intend to continue for years to come.

IMPACT ON FIELD

Plan writing in emergency management has often followed antiquated standards, producing plans that are hundreds of pages long and nearly unusable in an actual disaster. This was a phenomenon our department and I were determined to rectify, and the opportunity I had to spearhead the emergency operations plan update was the catalyst we needed to inspire definitive and long-lasting change countywide and across the field of emergency management. Plans are meant to be used and, like a good book, they are made to be read. This concept is often forgotten in plan writing, especially in emergency management. Plans in this field are often written as catch-alls and as legal protection in the case of catastrophe, rather than operational documents meant to be used by emergency personnel to respond and recover from emergencies more effectively. A plan overloaded with legal jargon and encompassing every specific scenario is a plan that will quickly bloat and consequently not be used during the actual emergencies they are intended for. By reducing Coconino County's emergency operations plan to less than 100 pages and including language that designates it as a document made for an all-hazards environment, rather than a specific disaster or emergency, we've provided an example for other jurisdictions to follow. This is the direction emergency management should be moving towards and by subscribing to these principles in my plan writing, I can help other agencies in crafting their operational documents to face 21st century threats.

IMPACT ON FIELD

As a Program Manager at MIT, I have significantly impacted the field of quantum photonics, quantum computing and artificial intelligence by helping lead a large research team in pioneering research in quantum optics, nanophotonics, nanotechnology and quantum computing. We are developing quantum silicon photonics for secure communication and laser research, creating advanced quantum information processing systems and exploring AI applications, such as integrating neural networks with quantum photonics to enhance machine learning and deep learning algorithms. My role involves managing strategic partnerships with industry leaders and government agencies, ensuring our research remains at the forefront of innovation. Through these collaborations, we aim to push the boundaries of what quantum photonics and AI can achieve, ultimately driving advancements that address global challenges and improve lives. Additionally, with my research with STELLAR and GENERATE, research has been done regarding microbial fuel cells, which allow individuals in developing countries to produce electricity through organic waste. Studies have ranged from Mexico to several countries in Africa.
